



Logging On: Resources for NEMO Programs at nemonet.uconn.edu

The For Members website is a password-protected section of the National NEMO Network website. This site is intended to facilitate the sharing of ideas, information and educational materials between Network members.

As Network programs grow and evolve, they develop their own educational materials and topical expertise. As a Network we need to prevent duplication of effort and stimulate multi-program collaboration, while also maintaining the independence and creative control of the originating programs. Thus, there is a need to make these products available to fellow NEMO programs, but without giving NEMO material away to competitors in the private and public sectors.

The **members only** section of the Network website is a part of the solution. Through this protected

site, NEMO programs can share information and materials within the confines of the Network. This speaks to the NEMO Network Charter, where programs agree to *“share information and materials freely with other Network projects, so that the Network becomes ‘more than the sum of its parts’ through the multiplying effects of information sharing.”*

This fact sheet details the wide variety of resources (and opportunities to share resources) available to Network members. Below is a brief overview of the site.

Nonpoint Education for Municipal Officials (NEMO) is a University of Connecticut educational program for land use decision makers that addresses the relationship of land use to natural resource protection.

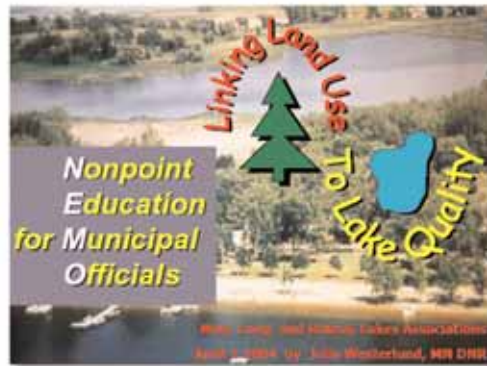

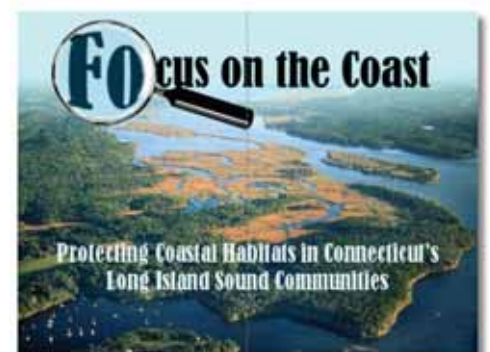


Linking Land Use to Lake Quality

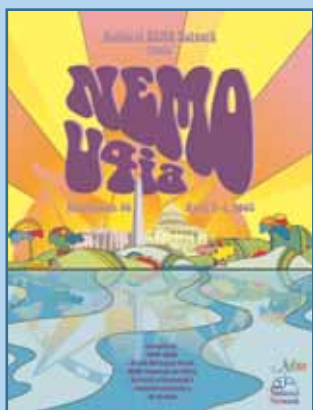
Focus on the Coast

- **Member Profile Update Form:** Use this handy form to update basic information for us to post on the NEMO Programs section of the National website.

Excerpts from the National Impact Reporting Form:

Part 1 Describe Your Program

This basic information about your program allows the Hub to generate Network-wide factoids on where we're working, with whom we're working, where our funding is coming from, etc.

Part 2 Describe What You Do

This gives us a handle on what kind of educational services you provide to your clientele.

Part 3 Community Level Impacts

This part attempts to capture what type of changes to local plans, regulations, and procedures have been catalyzed by your NEMO education.

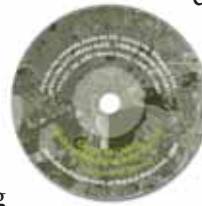
Nevada Fact Sheets
